

# Valedictory

Valedictorian Khristian Vinca addressed the Class of 2017. The following is an excerpt from his speech.

A CHALLENGE FOR ALL OF US is to make decisions that'll create a fulfilling experience for us in these coming years, in which we'll be able to look back upon our college experience with satisfaction. More than ever before, we will have a chance to explore our creativity, to develop critical thinking skills, and to really explore options we have never seen before. Let's get out of our comfort zone and join a club, meet someone new, or take a class that you've never heard of. But whatever happens, don't fall into the safety of complacency.

The fear of failure is prevalent in our generation. Success isn't easy and it'll take some time. Ten years from now we may still not have reached our desired goal, but what matters is that we're working to get there. Michelangelo once said, "The greater danger for most of us lies not in setting our aim too high and falling short, but in setting our aim too low and achieving our mark." This is a man who is considered one of the greatest artists of his time. Yet even though he reached many successes, he still recognized that success isn't what matters; rather, it is the willingness to work hard despite the risks of failing. I've failed countless times, and yes, it's embarrassing. I would make excuses and blame others for fear that I'd look bad, but I've learned that failing is human.

Just because we're graduating doesn't mean we won't encounter failure any more, and these caps and gowns don't mean that we have our lives figured out, because, let's face it, we're only 17 to 18 years old. But what these caps and gowns do represent is our determination in facing failure head on, despite the fears of the unknown. These pieces of clothing represent our resilience and curiosity. I'm sure that we're all fearful here, whether it's for the future or whether it's because we're not sure if we chose the right college—but let's not spend too much time thinking whether or not we have made the right decision that we end up doing the wrong decision. Let's use this time to figure out what we want to achieve, why we want to achieve it, and how we can become the person who will make it happen. Let's use this time to start taking risks. It's not so much the end goal that matters so long as we are receptive to growing in the ways we need to grow.

The mindset we have will shape the actions we take, the decisions we make, and the way we experience the world. Let's not miss opportunities when we make poor decisions based off of unhealthy mindsets. Self-limiting thoughts such as "I'm not good enough, I can't be bothered, or I don't have enough talent for that" create excuses for us that support our complacency. We live in a world in which it's become a norm for us to accept that one's dream is unattainable, unreasonable, or unrealistic just off the basis that others say so. Class, believe in your hard work and live to your full potential. Just because I'm giving this speech doesn't mean I'm the best nor does it guarantee me a successful life. We've all struggled through the same tests and classes, and we've all worked diligently and held our responsibilities. Many of you have experienced more successes than I'll ever knowparticipating in sports or doing extra curricular activities like Science Olympiad or Mock Trial. Not all forms of work involve getting the highest GPA or test score.

We have come so far, but let us not make this the point where we rest just yet. Our futures and dreams are shining brightly ahead of us; don't be governed by fears or crippled by anxiety.

Let's use this time to start taking risks. It's not so much the end goal that matters so long as we are receptive to growing in the ways we need to grow.



# **Commencement Address**

Claire Mitchell, high school science teacher and senior class advisor, gave the commencement address. The following is an excerpt from her speech.

I BELIEVE that the only one who can truly assign a meaning to creation is the creator Himself, and so, it is not our place, nor of our concern, to ask. The only true answer to the question of the



meaning of life is one of faith; we simply have to trust that there is one. What we are better served by asking, however, is not what the meaning of life itself is; rather, what is the meaning of our lives? Each of us was created with a unique role to play, should we choose to take up our charge. Shakespeare gives us a fitting metaphor in "As You Like It." He writes, "All the world's a stage, And all the men and women merely players; They have their exits and their entrances; And one man in his time plays many parts." I will only contend with Mr. Shakespeare on the word "merely." It is not merely a coincidence that you are alive at this time; it is not merely a coincidence that you were born to the family you belong to. There is a reason you grew up in Hawaii and not Ethiopia, and it is not by chance that you are sitting on this stage, on this day, surrounded by these people. You are not merely another cog in the mechanics of the universe, perpetuating the passing of time ad infinitum. Rather, as the Apostle Paul writes in Ephesians 2:10, "We are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do."

There are currently about 7.4 billion people on our planet, and you are here today because you have a gift that no one else has,

and one that the world desperately needs. ...David Viscott, a noted psychologist, said it best when he counseled, "The purpose of life is to discover your gift. The work of life is to develop it. The meaning of life is to give your gift away." Make no mistake, however; discovering your gifts and the meaning of your own life is not a passive undertaking. Seeking is an act that requires commitment, curiosity, creativity, an acceptance of inevitable failure, and subsequent perseverance. The meaning of your creation will not simply come to you in a dream or on a billboard. It will be revealed to you through closed doors and open windows; through a willingness to step out in faith; to look for opportunities and lessons in every success and especially every failure; through the ability to critically examine both your accomplishments and your goals; and the courage to make the necessary hard choices when they are called for.

## Your character will define you and that character is built on the impact you have on others.

In making your life about the greater good, and acknowledging your place in a larger story, you reject the accepted societal definition of success. By making this choice you are opting to be judged by your own personal merit. Your job, your career, your bank account balance, your car, the size of your house—these will not be the things that define you. Your character will define you and that character is built on the impact you have on others. That is true success: when you can look back and know that you made a positive difference, and that you left the world a little better than you found it.

He has also volunteered in the community by participating in Interact Club, and he played tuba in the school band. Among his classmates, he is seen as a natural community builder who knows everyone and can bring people together. Takatsuka's father, Reid, is a graduate from the class of 1983, and his mother, Claudine (Florenco), is a graduate from the class of 1992.

Oshiro is a Daughter of HBA, which means she has been a member of the HBA family since kindergarten. During her high school career, she was the sophomore class president, a student council representative, Dress Drive co-chair, Ministry Team leader and a counselor at grade-level camps. She also volunteered for Meals on Wheels, the Arthritis Foundation, and was a math tutor for elementary students. Oshiro's commitment to academics and love for the arts—exemplified by her participation in numerous AP courses, theater productions, Soldiers of Light, Mock Trial, the Eagle Eye news team, cross country, and track—led to a permanent spot on the honor roll and finalist honors in the National Merit Scholarship Program. 8th Grader Wins State Geographic Bee

IN WHAT COUNTRY can you find the city of Tauranga, located on the Bay of Plenty? Eighth grader Logan Kakugawa knows where it is, and he will never forget. On March 31, Kakugawa became the state champion of the Hawaii Geographic Bee after stating the bay's location. (In case you're wondering, the Bay of Plenty is located on New Zealand's North Island. # Service Dog Joins HBA Ohana

HAWAII BAPTIST ACADEMY has added a new, furry member to its ohana. On May 23, the school welcomed Buddy, a Diabetic Alert Dog, to the high school campus. He is assisting ninth grader Mason Mayeda, who has Diabetes Type 1.

Buddy, who is a golden retriever and poodle mix, has been specifically trained to react to changes in Mason's blood sugar levels by smelling his breath or perspiration. When a change

occurs, Buddy alerts Mason by pawing at him. There is no cure for Diabetes Type 1. Those who suffer from the disease are dependent upon insulin for their entire lives. Edwin Peeples, a trainer for Diabetic Alert Dogs, says dogs can detect changes in the body 30 minutes faster than a machine. The early warning may prevent a visit to the hospital, and may even save Mason's life. Buddy cost the Mayedas \$15,000, and he was not covered by insurance. But for the Mayedas, it's a great investment that provides invaluable peace of mind.

"I wake up around 1:30 or 2 o'clock in the morning to take [Mason's] blood sugar levels to make sure he'll make it through the night. Now Buddy's there so we can lean on Buddy," John Mayeda, Mason's father, said in an interview with Hawaii News Now.

The students were introduced to Buddy at a school assembly, where they learned to treat Buddy as a service animal and not as a pet. HBA is one of the first private schools on the island of Oahu to allow service dogs.

"I am very proud of HBA for allowing a service dog on campus to support Mason. We really want HBA to be a place where all of our students can feel that they belong, and they are supported. This is also a great opportunity for our students to learn about the role of a service animal. It is my hope that our students will come to appreciate the tremendous assistance that service animals provide," said Marsha Hirae '72, high school principal.

# Alumni Chronicles Samantha (Johnson) Hague '86

To do justice to the amazing journey of Samantha "Sam" (Johnson) Hague '86 would take a book. But the long story short brings to mind the verse from Psalm 68:6—"God setteth the solitary in families."

Sam says that in September of 1997, "I was a single mom of a six-year-old daughter [Lyxee] in Australia and doing my training with Youth With a Mission. Twenty years later, I'm in East Texas on staff with YWAM, a grandmother of two delightful and precious children that live in England, a newlywed, a new mother to a nine-yearold son with ADHD, and the caregiver of my mother with Alzheimer's."

Most of those 20 years have been with Living Alternatives (www. livingalternatives.org), a ministry that serves about 150 girls a month at a Pregnancy Resource Center for free pregnancy tests and ultrasounds. Sam has worked directly at Fatherheart, a maternity home connected with the Center. In those years she has assisted at several births and has loved and counseled hundreds of often very young mothers. Sam's letters tell about the struggles of these girls to overcome abuse, fear, addiction, guilt, and bad decisions. Some stories have happy endings, with babies going to adoptive families. Others are less happy, with girls returning to Fatherheart with repeat pregnancies. One of these babies became part of Sam's family.

Sam met her husband, Todd, through his mother, Doreen Hague, who is the director of the Pregnancy Resource Center. Love blossomed and they married in 10 months. Todd has three biological brothers and three adopted siblings. One of these, Sherri, was adopted at the age of two. Sherri had had a rough start, with emotional scars that even a loving new family couldn't heal. As a teen, she stayed at Fatherheart herself, where Sam did her admission interview and intake,

and gave birth to Dominic. Because of Sherri's instability, caring for the child fell to Doreen and Todd. Eventually Todd adopted Dominic himself.

After they were married, Todd and Sam began to discuss adoption, so that Sam would be Dominic's legal mother. But they both rely on donations for their income, with not much money for the lawyers' fees. To the rescue came Shannon, a former Fatherheart girl who is now a wife, mother, and para-legal. Her business, FED-UP LEGAL SOLUTIONS, prepares documents for clients. With the further help of a sympathetic lawyer, Dominic was adopted on December 12, 2016, the day after his ninth birthday, thus starting his tenth year with a mom. Big sister Lyxee joined the family via FaceTime in the courtroom.

Sam says, "How God put this all together is so beautiful!" He indeed has put together a family for a woman who has helped so many others do the same.

They reside in Texas. Todd teaches history and literature at Christian Heritage School. Sam's daughter, Lyxee, lives in England with her husband and their two children. Lyxee and her husband are also YWAM missionaries.
